Scottish Heritage Report for National Committee Meeting - 26 February 2022

24 Group - Edinburgh - Info from Joe Yeardly

24 Group reports that the Group is still going along for now under a new structure with a slimmed down Admin. A face to face meeting in November 2021 was managed before the new wave of Covid struck.

Some of the members have been liaising with the National Museums of Scotland over the last couple of years on a project in respect of former ROC equipment and materials they hold. The project includes interviews, visits and video recorded interviews explaining the use of the equipment and the roles of the Corps.

Barnton Quarry

Not directly related to the ROC but never the less of interest to those followers of Cold War refurbishments. Originally used for RAF fighter command operations during WW11 it then became a Rotor Radar 4 Station and SOC (Sector Operations Sector) before its final operational years as an RSG (Regional Seat of Government). In 2011, Barnton Quarry was bought by the owners of Anstruther Rotor Station - Scotland's popular 'Secret Bunker' and a team enthusiastic volunteers have devoted themselves to restoring the burnt-out bunker back to its 1952 construction state.

Dundee 28 Group follow this project with interest and the Cragiebarns Team at Dundee work closely with Grant More the Project Manager at Barnton. We are all so pleased with the news of their museum plans being approved by Edinburgh Council as below.

Edinburgh nuclear bunker to become museum as plans approved by council.

Until 1982 the Barnton Quarry bunker played a key role in the country's defence against nuclear threat from Russia - and would have been home to hundreds of politicians and civil servants in the event of an attack.

A secret Cold War bunker in Edinburgh that was once Scotland's first line of defence against the threat of a nuclear attack will be turned into a museum after plans were approved by Edinburgh City Council.

Buried 100ft below Corstorphine Hill and behind 10ft of reinforced concrete and tankmetal blast doors, the Barnton Quarry bunker has been out of use for nearly 40 years. Now thanks to a hard-working team of volunteers who've spent the last decade clearing, fixing and restoring the Category-A listed site, it is set to open to the public.

Between 1946 and 1982, as the possibility of an attack from Russia loomed, it served as the RAF's operations command centre for all of Scotland's radar stations, scanning the skies for potential threats and gathering data from across the country.

The stone quarry itself was operational until 1914 before first being used for RAF fighter command operations from 1942. The nuclear bunker element was built ten years later.

Emergency operations bunker in the Highland capital of Inverness

Another location that has seen varied activities from WW11 onwards includes The ROC's 39 Group HQ during WW11 and later 30 Group HQ - fondly know as Raigmore and finally becoming an Emergency Operations Bunker.

Some may remember I mentioned the purchase of Raigmore by Dr Iain Maoileoin in my Report of February 2020. Iain seems to have made plenty of progress in these last two fallow years and is now offering tours.

Extract from The Ross-shire Journal:-

People passing by could be forgiven for thinking they are back in the Cold War era with the latest arrivals at the Emergency Operations Bunker in Inverness.

The site's owner, Dr Iain Maoileoin, has acquired an armoured personnel carrier and a helicopter - which has flown the then Prime Minister among its passengers in 1981.

He bought the former council property and military installation in Mackintosh Road in 2019 and his long-term plan is to create a guided tour museum there.

He said: "The place is steeped in history and has been in constant use since it was built, as one of three bunkers in 1940."

In the past, the bunker was used by the RAF as a filter room for processing raw data from the Chain Home and Chain Home Low radar stations that were around the coast of Scotland, northern England, part of Ireland and also the Isle of Man.

It was later used by members of the Royal Observer Corps (ROC) as one of two bunkers they used and, when the ROC was disbanded, the local authority took over the three bunkers - two were later destroyed.

The planned renovation work will focus on the radar and on the nuclear side of the building's history and so far there is a creation of a 1939/40 radar system and filter room.

He said: "So far we have had around 700 people through the building in small-group guided tours. Part of these tours were done under Doors-open Days and some under the Highland Archaeology Festival."

One of the more unusual tours was aimed at getting people out of the house on Christmas Day.

Military Museum Scotland SCIO - Kirknewton, West Lothian

This museum has just celebrated its 5th birthday. Ian Ingles runs the Museum as a Trust. It offers a fascinating insight into Scotland's Military History covering WWI to the present dav.

The Primary aim of Military Museum Scotland, and the newly launched Military Museum Scotland Outreach, is education and reminiscence, from Primary schools to Senior Citizens, it caters for everyone including not surprisingly our Veterans.

Veterans Drop in takes place every day the museum is open. The Veterans breakfast Club, now in its second year, is on the 2nd and last Sunday of every month.

Steve Dalton refurbisher of Clova Post is a volunteer and displays his ROC Collection. Most recently a couple of weeks ago and Ian Ingles made this acknowledgement to him on their
